

NoveList is an online service for connecting readers with books. It covers all age groups, fiction and nonfiction, and is the perfect tool for finding everything from pleasure reads to books for student assignments. The site includes information on millions of books, as well as providing resources for librarians and teachers. To access the database, go to http://ncantonlibrary.com/databases and select NoveList from the alphabetical list. When outside the Library, you will need your library card number to sign in.



The **Home Page** has a **Search Box** at the top middle where you can search by Author, Title, Keyword, Series, or Narrator. Browse **Recommended Reads Lists** on the left side for book lists as diverse as Chick Lit for Adults to Dinosaur fiction for children Ages 0-8. Additional recommendations for books based on **Appeal** are listed at the top center of the page. Below that, **Browse Genres**, explore **Featured Read-alikes**, make sure you're **Keeping Up** with various genres, or check out **Featured Award Winners** and **Audiobooks**. In all cases, hovering over a book jacket opens a popup box with information about the book.

Click a **Recommended Reads List** option to view the selection of lists.



Along the top are tabs with collections of lists and articles covering various topics including Browse By and Quick Links.



Browse By

- See what's New and Popular in **Genres**, such as Mysteries, Romance, and Nonfiction for Adults, Realistic for Teens, and Picture Books for Ages 0-8.
- Combine **Appeal** factors, such as Complex Character in a Fast-paced novel for Teens to find the perfect book.
- **Themes** are arranged by genre and include concepts like Fake relationship (Romance) and Pandemic apocalypse (Science Fiction).
- See lists of Award Winners for all age levels, such as winners of the Newbery Medal, Michael L.
 Printz Award, and the Pulitzer Prize.
- There are several lists for Audiobooks, including New and Forthcoming as well as Classics For the Entire Family.


Quick Links

Here are a few Quick Links that are particularly good for finding your next great read:

- Access over 300 Author Read-alikes lists, which contain similar authors to popular writers as diverse as Ted Dekker, Kristin Hannah, Margaret Atwood, and Jeffrey Archer.
- View a list of Books to Movies for the current vear.
- Grab and Go Book Lists have 20-35 titles on a certain topic for different grade levels, such as
 recommended books about "Medieval Times: Nonfiction for Grades 6-8" and "Weather: Fiction for
 Grades K-2."
- There are more than 130 Feature Articles in NoveList, covering topics ranging from "Crime
 Through Time: A Brief Exploration of Historical True Crime" to "Harmful Intent: An Annotated List of
 Teen Fiction on Bullying."


You can also begin your exploration by entering an Author, Title, Series, Narrator, or Keyword in the Search Box at the top of every page. Note NoveList uses autofill to predict the search, so you can click the desired result as soon as it appears and stop typing.







Results are sorted by Relevance, but can be changed to Author, Title, Date, Popularity, Volume, and Narrator using the dropdown menu at the top right. Narrow the search using the limiters on the left side under Refine Results, including Audience (age) and Fiction/Nonfiction. Be sure to click Update Results when all limiters are set. Continue down the left for additional limiters for things such as Theme, Pace, and Subject. The list defaults to Books, but if other records are available, other tabs appear, such as Audiobooks, Series, Authors, and Lists & Articles. Click a title on the list to see that item's full record.



Book records have multiple distinct sections. The top of the record has bibliographic information: Author, title, and publication date. If the book is part of a Series, the name of the series and this book's order in the series are listed. This is followed by a brief Description of the plot, as well as Book Appeal Terms about the book's Tone, Pace, and other aspects. When available, there is also a field for Lexile and Accelerated Reader information. **Read-alikes** are on the right, and hovering over any Read-alike's cover opens a box with a description of that book and the specific Reason why it is a read-alike for this book. For instance, a book may be listed as a read-alike because of plot similarities, comparable pacing, or like writing style. Also in this top section is a link to **View Copies Available** if NCPL owns it.

The Read-alikes also list whether or not NCPL owns them. Click **View Copies** and then **Go to Catalog** to be taken to the NCPL catalog. (The pop-up box does not list the ebooks and e-audio owned, but they will show in the NCPL catalog.)




Below the bibliographic information, there are potentially four tabs, depending on if they apply to the item: Reviews, Audiobooks, More About This Book, and Lists & Articles.




Reviews is the default tab when they are available. The reviews come from professional publications, such as *Library Journal*, *Magill*, *Kirkus*, and *Publishers Weekly*.

The **Audiobooks** tab appears for titles available on audio. Information includes the Narrator, Duration, and whether it is Unabridged, Abridged, or Dramatized, as well as a brief description.


Occasionally, there are listening samples, and when applicable, Series information, Lexile, Accelerated Reader Level, and other information similar to the main record.






The **More About This Book** tab again provides bibliographic information, but includes additional fields, such as Dewey Number, special Notes, and all available ISBNs. Genres, Themes, Subject Headings, and more are listed and hyperlinked so as to make finding similar books easier.

Lists & Articles appear when the title is included on any of the site's Lists (like Grab and Go Lists) or in any Articles. This includes Book Discussion Guides for the title, as well as Guides in which it is referenced. For more popular authors, there will be a link to an Author Read-alikes essay. There will also be links if the title is included in Curricular Connections, Recommended Reads, or any other lists.







Search for More at the bottom of the record allows you to click as many appeal checkboxes as desired to fashion a search for books that fit specific criteria. For instance, generate a list of books that are Epic Fantasy with Wizards that includes a Quest for magical items. Results become pretty thin if more than three options are selected, so pick the two or three most important to get the best results. Click Search in the bottom left when all criteria have been selected.

Advanced Search is

reached by clicking the link under the search box at the top of the page. Every field in NoveList is either searchable or available as a limiter here. If no field is selected from the dropdown menus at the top, NoveList will perform a keyword search. This is a good way to describe a plot, perhaps of a book whose title you forget.





Two of the most popular Limiters are designed for helping students find the perfect book: Lexile and Accelerated Reader. You can use one of NoveLists's predefined **Lexile Range** options or type in a specific **Lexile Score**. (A specific range cannot be entered.) Select an **Accelerated Reader Interest Level** from the predefined ranges, or type in a **Book Level** to locate a book for exact grade level difficulty. Many limiters require that at least one search term be entered at the top of the page. Whatever limiters you choose, just click **Search** at the bottom left once all are selected.
